DAVID POWERS

Presentation Description: What is the Number 1 hazard in any workplace? If you guessed complacency, then you understand how it can slowly erode your OHS program. Whether it is through errors, violations or a combination, safety erosion takes on many different forms and can be very subtle! Join David as he explores these different forms that complacency can take and steps you can take to help stop the erosion of your safety program.

TAMMY MCCABE

Presentation Description: The construction industry is a high-risk workplace with lots of potential for physical harm. But what about the risk associated with poor mental health and death by suicide? It is well-established that construction workers represent one of the highest occupational risk groups for suicide internationally. Join Tammy as she explores some of the factors that place the construction industry at higher risk and learn about the work being done by an industry stakeholder group in Newfoundland and Labrador, to try and bring mental health and suicide awareness and support to the industry.

DARREL NICKERSON

Presentation Description: When we hear the term fit for duty we typically think about drug and alcohol programs but being fit for duty means that an employee's physical, emotional, and mental condition allows them to perform essential job duties in a proper, safe, and competent manner.

This presentation will break down the components that make up fit for duty and identify the risk factors that should be addressed with some mitigation strategies you can use to help your employees be Fit for Duty.

JOHANNES DOEMER

Presentation Description: This presentation will explore the importance of managing silica exposure during project work. Attendees will learn about the hazardous effects of silica exposure and the corresponding regulatory requirements for employers. The presentation will also cover tools and resources available to help employers effectively manage silica exposure in the workplace. By the end of this session, participants will have a better understanding of the risks associated with silica exposure and steps they can take to mitigate those risks and protect employees.

How effective is your JHSC?

WorkSafeNB is pleased to share a new tool to help joint health and safety committees (JHSCs) excel in New Brunswick.

JHSCs are critical in helping employers develop and maintain healthy and safe workplaces. They're an important communication link between employees and management and can help create and maintain a positive health and safety culture. Effective JHSCs can influence injury and illness prevention in our province.

WorkSafeNB's new self-evaluation tool allows JHSCs to measure their committee's effectiveness and see areas they can improve on.

It focuses on six areas: structure; awareness and communication; employer interaction and support; hazard identification; recommendations; and meeting minutes.

Please note that this quiz is intended for JHSCs in <u>fixed workplaces</u>. Different requirements apply to committees for <u>project sites</u>.

Improved JHSC minutes template for committees

WorkSafeNB is pleased to share an improved minutes template for New Brunswick joint heath and safety committees (JHSCs). The template comes after consultation with JHSCs across the province.

JHSC meeting minutes are a legislative requirement of the Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Act. JHSCs must use a template approved by WorkSafeNB and submit the completed minutes to WorkSafeNB after each meeting.

Workplaces can use the template provided by WorkSafeNB or customize the template to their specific needs (requires final WorkSafeNB approval - see interpretation for more information).

The new template offers:

- Improved clarity for workplace location
- Clarification for agenda sections
- Email and phone information for co-chairpersons
- English only, French only and bilingual versions
- Word and fillable PDF options

WorkSafeNB now offers one email address for all minutes submissions: <u>jhsc-cmhs@ws-ts.nb.ca</u>. Fax and mail submission continues to also be available.

The OHS Act requires JHSCs for workplaces with 20 or more employees in the same location. Project sites differ.

JHSCs are a vital tool in creating and maintaining positive, injury-free health and safety workplaces in our province.
